

WALKER PLEAS EFFECT PROSECUT
Governor Denies Motion To Dismiss Charges In Few Words
COUNSEL ARGUES CASE SEVEN HOURS
Court Delays Decision On Mayor's Action Until Monday

EXECUTIVE CHAMBER, ALBANY, N. Y. August 19. (AP)—Governor Roosevelt, in 37 words, denied today to dismiss other charges against Mayor James J. Walker of New York City after listening to seven hours of argument by John J. Curtin, Walker's chief counsel.

On Monday, the eighth day of the executive hearing, Walker will introduce witnesses, several of them Republican state leaders, including W. Kingland Meyer, the state chairman.

Walker contends the Republicans inspired a legislative investigation of Tammany Hall to bring Walker into a more favorable economic situation and embarrass Mr. Roosevelt's campaign for the Federal nomination.

The supreme court of New York today became an important participant in the dispute over the Mayor's fitness to retain his post when it refused to grant a writ of mandamus on a motion to restrain the court from acting on a motion which had been filed by George Donnelly, home rule reformer.

Court Decision Delayed
Mayor Walker's own court move to determine the government's right to handle the case was continued until Monday by Justice State.

Before he returns to the sonber of government, Justice State, Roosevelt will have made the first invasion of Republican territory in his campaign for the presidency tomorrow the Democratic nominee Alfred E. Smith, talked through two days in behalf of his client, summing up his plea he exclaimed, "I do not profess to be a lawyer, but I am a citizen and I have charges have any bearing on the official conduct of the mayor."

DECLINES ABOUT CANCELLED GAINS OF PRECEDING DAY

Easier Wheat Market Has Bearish Effect On Trading

NEW YORK, August 19. (AP)—The stock market ended the session on a decline today rather than an upturn as it did yesterday.

The decline about cancelled yesterday's gains. Stocks opened sustained strength in bonds. The market found itself unable to advance in the face of a rise in wheat.

If the upturn late yesterday was in anticipation of the overnight announcement of completion of plans for forming the \$50,000,000 commodities credit corp., the bullish force of the announcement was largely spent in that advance.

Stocks opened stronger today, but began to sag after a few minutes. Bullish efforts in various specialties later in the morning failed to attract attention.

Possibly the advance rumors of the Commodities Credit corp. had been too enthusiastic. However, the banking agencies made it clear that the corporation was to perform only a normal, conservative banking function through financing the movement of raw materials to manufacturers.

The corporation did not embrace the suggested plan of forming a syndicate to take over the farm boards' action, as had been expected in some quarters recently, but it was acknowledged that the project might eventually be carried out separately.

At any rate, cotton futures closed 15 to 20 cents a bale lower, and wheat off about 1 1/2 cents.

Trading was very dull during most of the day, but the top of the market reached 2,166 1/2 shares, or roughly 400,000 more than the 1,766 1/2 shares was only 6-10 of one point, although some of the leaders were off 1 to more than 3.

J. I. Case closed only 3-4. Miscellaneous issues off a point or more included International Harvester, Westinghouse, and others.

Among less active issues, however, there were many small gains, and some of the more active shares held up well, particularly among the specialties.
