Police To Have Modern Plan For Their Records

New System Will Be Put In Use Here Within Few Days

Changes in the method of docketing prisoners at police headquarters here will be made within the next few days.

The old police "blotter" used by the department here for the past half century will be supplanted by a new and more useful card system, which persons arrested will be docketed on a separate card. This card will be filed out in duplicate by the desk sergeant.

At present the "blotter" lists only the arrested person's name, address, color, crime charged, arresting officers, time of arrest and state and offense witnesses. The new card system a more complete history and description of persons arrested will be filed.

The record system of the department used for many years has become obsolete and unworkable when compared with that of most cities of this size, it is declared. The new plan will enable the officers to have more of a history of the cases. Individuals handled by the department. An exacting system of records is now recognized as one of the most necessary adjuncts to successful operation of modern police departments.

Contains Much Data

The name of the prisoner, his address, known aliases, date of birth, date at last birthday will be listed, prisoner's occupation, country of birth, complexion, color of hair, eyes, marks or scars visible, and the complaint with which arrested.

If the prisoner shows any impairment of speech, has drooping shoulders, tattoo marks, gold teeth, or has square shoulders, these facts will be recorded on the card. If a prisoner is right or left handed, or has any noticeably high-pitched voice or is wearing jewelry, these facts will be shown on the card.

Previous police records, if any, will also be shown with the time of new arrest, exact location of arrest, arresting officer, charges against the person, and names of witnesses are entered on the card. A space is also provided for an entry showing final disposition of the case.

To Take Fingerprints

It is planned to place the fingerprint equipment of the department in operation. Fingerprints of all persons docketed at headquarters, except those arrested for traffic violations, violations of city ordinance, or any minor charges where the offender is known to be a reputable citizen, will be made. Fingerprints will be taken of all persons arrested for being drunk, disorderly conduct, assault and battery, carrying a dangerous weapon, or for other offenses, and suspects as well as persons brought in for other more serious nature.

After the record of an arrest is filled out the duplicate is given to the arresting officer and the original placed in the files of the department. The arresting officer retains his copy until he settles in court. His copy shows final disposition of the case on the card. It is turned in to the bureau of records of the department to allow completion of the office copy.

Favored by Stone

This system has been recommended by Donald Stone, research director of the National Police Association, and Capt. W. B. Woods, former chief of the detective bureau of the Berkeley, Cal., police department. These men were brought here by city officials to aid in making needed changes in the record bureau of the police department.

Members of the department met last night in the locker room of the department and heard Mr. Stone and Capt. Woods explain how the new system will help Asheville. Mr. Stone said the police department to a higher standard of efficiency.
