INSTRUCTIONS OF ASSISTANT POSTMASTER GENERAL BUREAU OF TRANSPORTATION

AIR SERVICE

A. M. 29

Effective on or about June 1, 1951, air mail service will be inaugurated at Great Bend, Kans., over route A. M. 29.

Special cachet will be provided for Great Bend and the usual treatment of philatelic mail will be authorized.

First-flight air-mail covers sent to the postmaster at Great Bend must be prepaid at the appropriate air-mail postage rate. Double postal cards and double post cards intended for return reply purposes are not acceptable as first-flight covers. All covers should be accompanied by a letter authorizing the holding of the covers for the first flight and requesting the application of the cachet. Space approximately 2½ by 2½ inches to the left on the address side of all covers is required for the cachet.

No provision will be made for point to point covers. However, at request of collectors, covers receiving cachet will be given directional service only

to an office designated by the General Superintendent, Postal Transportation Service, and served by the first flight in each direction, and will there be backstamped and dispatched onward to destination.

A. M. 81

Effective on or about May 15, 1951, air mail service will be inaugurated at Borger, Tex., over feeder route A. M. 81.

Special cachet will be provided for Borger and the usual treatment of philatelic mail will be authorized.

First-flight air-mail covers sent to the postmaster at Borger must be prepaid at the appropriate air-mail postage rate. Double postal cards and double post cards intended for return-reply purposes are not acceptable as first-flight covers. All covers should be accompanied by a letter authorizing the holding of the covers for the first flight and requesting the application of the cachet. Space approximately 2½ by 2½ inches to the left on the address side of all covers is required for the cachet.

No provision will be made for point-to-point covers. However, at request of collectors, covers receiving cachet will be given directional service only to an office designated by the General Superintendent, Postal Transportation Service, and served by the first flight in each direction, and will there be backstamped and dispatched onward to destination.

A. M. 99

Pursuant to Order E-5328 issued by the Civil Aeronautics Board effective April 25, 1951, authorizing Trans-Pacific Airways to engage in the transportation of mail on route A. M. 99, mail service will be designated on this route effective May 15, 1951.

This route will operate as follows: Between the terminal point Honolulu, Oahu; the intermediate points Hoolehua, Molokai; Lanai City, Lanai; Maalaea, Maui; Upolu Point, Hawaii; Kailua, Hawaii; and the terminal point Hilo, Hawaii. Between the terminal point Honolulu, Oahu; and the terminal point island of Kauai.

Inasmuch as these offices are presently served by route A. M. 33, no official cachets will be provided for the inauguration of this service.

INSTRUCTIONS OF ASSISTANT POSTMASTER GENERAL BUREAU OF FINANCE

INSTRUCTIONS OF ASSISTANT POSTMASTER GENERAL BUREAU OF FACILITIES

SUBMISSION OF FORM 1809-B

Postmasters at motor vehicle service offices employing contract vehicles on an hourly or annual rate basis for city delivery service or vehicles secured under Public Law 900 for special delivery service are required to report quarterly to the Bureau of Facilities, Division of Motor Vehicle Service, on Form 1809-B (Revised 11-50), Statement of Expenditures and Obligations for Vehicles Used in City Delivery Service. Although many incomplete reports are received, dead lines in the Department will not permit their return for correction. Postmasters should take every precaution to see that they furnish complete data and that it is furnished within 5 days after the close of each quarter.

BOND DRIVE POSTER—LOBBY DISPLAY AUTHORIZED

The Treasury Department will in the near future distribute to postmasters at all offices offering savings bonds for sale, a poster entitled "Your Bonds Are Better Than Ever" in connection with a series E bond drive.

Upon its receipt the poster should be displayed in a prominent location in the public lobby in such manner as not to mar the walls or woodwork, for a reasonable length of time so long as it continues to present a good appearance.

The foregoing instructions do not apply to post office lobbies located in Government-owned buildings not operated by the Post Office Department.

CHANGES—POSTAL GUIDE 1950—PART II

BELGIUM—PROHIBITIONS

CHANGE No. 170.

Page 101.—In the subcaption "Insurance" (inserted by Change No. 144 in the POSTAL BULLETIN of December 26, 1950), the first sentence of the third paragraph is changed by deleting the words "coin, bank notes, currency, notes, or any kind of securities payable to bearer."

In the subcaption "Prohibitions," add the following under "For other reasons":

"Instruments of payment including bank notes and currency may not be sent to Belgium by parcel post unless permission for the importation has been granted by the Belgo-Luxembourg Exchange Institute. If such permission has been granted and the sender elects to forward the articles by parcel post, the parcel must be insured; otherwise, such articles must be sent by registered letter mail."

FINLAND—PROHIBITIONS

CHANGE No. 171.

Page 171.—In the subcaption "Prohibitions," the last paragraph under "State monopolies, etc." is superseded by the following:

"Medicines and drugs, including any substances which may be classed as pharmaceuticals by the Finnish authorities, may not be sent by mail unless addressed to authorized manufacturers, dealers, scientists, or public health officials for use or distribution in accordance with Finnish regulations. Such substances prepared in doses for use by patients must be clearly and correctly labeled showing the nature and quantity of the ingredients. If found unacceptable under the Finnish regulations, any such articles may be prohibited or confiscated by the authorities."
